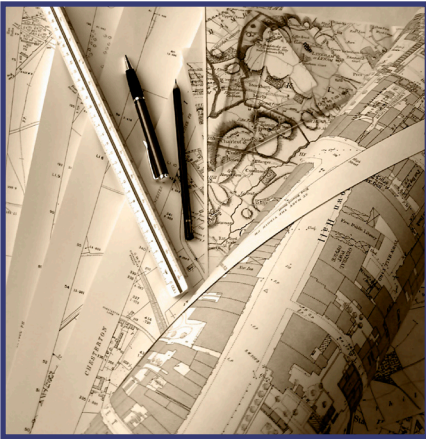

The East Sussex Transport and Trading Company extracted gravel from the beach at Cuckmere Haven. They transported the material to the road at Exceat along this 2'-gauge tramway. It was established in the early 1930s and closed in 1964. The tramway began in what is now the car park on the southern side of the main road. (4).

The course of the tramway is now used as a footpath. In several areas it can be discerned as a flat platform distinct from the surrounding slight slopes and uneven ground. It has been removed from the area of the car park to the north-east of the boat house (OA 254).

The only surviving portion is a pair of rails sunk into concrete (OA 331) that form a bridge over a drain. (2), (3)

Stone on site of Church (NR). (1) Exceat Parish Church. The church stood almost due S of the village of West Dean, 300 yds from, and on the S side of the present main road. It was already completely destroyed in 1460 though vestiges were perceptible until the site was ploughed in the mid-19thc. Excavations were conducted in 1913 by the Rev G W A Lawrance and Sussex Arch Soc. The church was considered to date from AD 1050-80. (See plan). The site is now marked by a block of stone bearing a descriptive inscription, erected by the Ssx AS. (2) (TV 522992) Exceat, a lost village. In 1460 only two houses remained and the church was in ruins. It may have been a Plague casualty but local tradition (supported in part by the Nonarum Inquisitiones) favours devastation by marauding Frenchmen.
